FARMINGTON—Walter Rampton, 82, life-long resident of Davis county, died at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Lillie Hepworth, Farmington, Sunday at 10:50 a.m. of a heart ailment.

Until 1910, he had worked as a blacksmith. At that time he opened the Rampton drugstore here, which he operated until his retirement in 1929.

From 1935 to 1943 he had been justice of the peace in Farmington precinct and had also been a member of the city council for a number of years. As a young man he was a member of the Bountiful Fife and Drum band and the Utah state militia.
