

WILLIAM RAMPTON DEAD.

After a long and Severe Illness He Succumbs to Bright's Disease.

William Rampton, who passed away in Pocatello a week ago Tuesday, was buried in Salt Lake City, last Thursday.

Funeral services were held in Pocatello Wednesday afternoon and in Salt Lake the following afternoon.

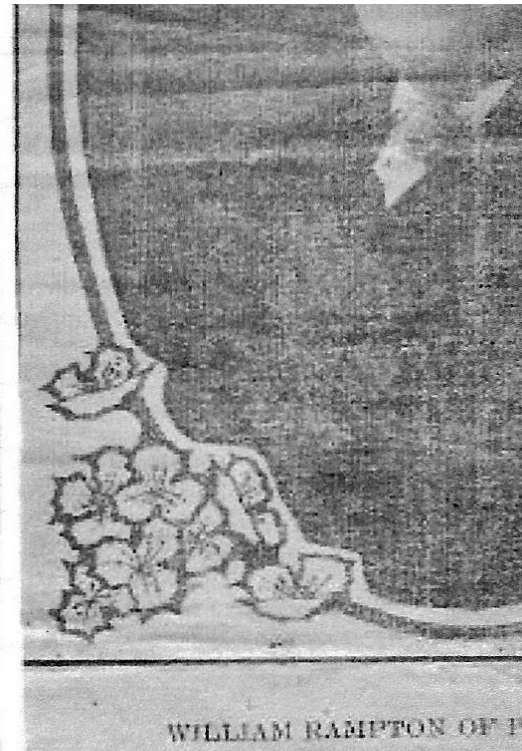
The greatest respect was shown him in Pocatello, even the District court adjourned, while the obsequies were being held.

Deceased was a member of five fraternal orders—the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, the Eagles, Knights of Pythias, Workmen and Woodmen. He was buried under the auspices of the Elks and for a time was Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler in the Pocatello district.

Deceased was taken ill about two years ago with Bright's disease. He visited the Hot Lakes and Southern California and employed the best medical skill but nothing could effect a cure.

Last fall he seemed some better and for a short time attended to business again, but soon grew worse and since before the holidays was confined to his room and the last two months to his bed. Toward the last he was unconscious a great deal of the time.

The Pocatello Tribune spoke very highly of him. It is said he

was one of "Nature's noblemen, a prince among men", a good citizen and one of the most popular business men in Pocatello.

Deceased was born in Bountiful forty-eight years ago and is a son of the late Henry Rampton and Frances Dinwoody Rampton.

He leaves a wife and four children, three sons and a daughter.

Mr. Rampton spent nearly all his life in the furniture business. When but a young man he started to work in his uncle Henry Dinwoody's furniture store, where he learned every detail of the business. He was the manager and practically the sole owner of the Idaho Furniture Co. until but a short time prior to his death.
